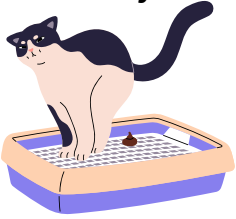




Choosing the right cat litter depends on your cat's preferences and your household's specific needs. Below is a summary of the most common options:

1. Clay Litter (Traditional): Made of bentonite clay, this is the most affordable and widely available option.



- Pros: Excellent clumping and odor control; generally well-accepted by cats.
- Cons: Heavy, dusty, prone to tracking, and not biodegradable.



2. Silica Gel (Crystal): Made from porous silica sand to absorb moisture.

- Cons: Poor clumping and requires frequent full changes to manage odors.

For cats with asthma or sensitivities, it is often recommended to use unscented, low-dust options. Additionally, health-monitoring litters like PrettyLitter can be helpful, as they change color to indicate potential health issues like UTIs or kidney problems, though any changes should be confirmed by a veterinarian.
